


## **Book Review**

I had a mad dash to get home from work on Wednesday 14th September as I needed to catch the 17.09 train from Derby to London. Me and my mum were making the journey to go and join 'The Queue' to see our late Queen Elizabeth II Lying in State in Westminster Hall. We made sure we knew where to join by watching the regular updates on YouTube as to where the back of the queue was. Thankfully, we joined relatively early on at just 2.6 miles long which meant we were headed for London Bridge. As soon as we joined we made a friend, a lovely lady who is a volunteer at Hull Minster and chatting to her made the first few hours pass quite quickly. As we approached the London Eye we were given our all important wristbands but we still had a long way to go! It was night time now in London and it was wonderful seeing the famous landmarks all lit up, we took many photos to remember this.







Once we got into the grounds of Westminster Hall we had several hours of the queue snaking backwards and forwards but we did manage to have around an hour to sit down and rest as they had closed the hall to clean and also to rehearse the processions ready for the funeral. When we started moving again there was a loud cheer from the thousands of queuers who, at this point, were very tired, aching and cold, but still determined to pay their respects to our Queen. We got through the security checkpoint and made our way into Westminster Hall and the atmosphere completely changed. The only sounds were the distant music of the marching bands outside (still rehearsing for the funeral) and the quiet prayers and 'thank yous' as people bowed and curtsied when they passed the sparkling crown jewels atop the coffin of Her Majesty. Me and my mum were hugging as we left the hall and still wiping away our tears. Such a sad moment but it was one I will never forget and I am so grateful to have been able to make the journey in person. Afterwards we walked through the eerily quiet streets of London (it was around 4.30am) towards Green Park to view the floral tributes and to lay flowers on behalf of our church members. We chose a fitting red, white and blue bouquet and left it amongst many Paddington Bears by a beautiful tree. The whole experience was one I was hoping would never happen, the Queen was such an important part of my life but as Her Majesty once said 'grief is the price we pay for love'. I loved her, and I still do.

## **History**

An extract from an article by Royden Green, 1953

The chancel was rebuilt in 1887, the cost being borne by the Lay Rector. Five years later the north wall of the Chancel was opened and the vestry (now the chapel) extended to its present size to accommodate the new organ.

Further extensions were made in 1908 when the South Aisle was added. This necessitated the removal of the Porch and South Door.

The South Door was rebuilt stone for stone as the original and so its claim to be of Norman origin may be upheld. Let us look at those parts of our church which have a just claim to antiquity.

The South Doorway and Choir Vestry (now chapel) Doorway are of Norman origin. The Windows in the South Aisle, the East Window, the South Chancel Window and the South Vestry Window are all early English, probably 15th Century.

The Porch is probably 550 years old. Much of the old stonework was trimmed and reused in several restorations.




I Vow to Thee My Country

Played at Prince Philip's funeral, the hymn'l Vow to Thee My Country' describes the ways a Christian's loyalties are divided between a person's homeland and God's kingdom.

Diplomat Sir Cecil Rice wrote the poem between 1908 and 1912. It was originally titled 'Urbs Dei' (The City of God'). In 1921, Gustav Holst set the words to a specially adapted version of 'Jupiter' from his suite The Planets. Five years later he added harmonies so it could become a hymn to be sung in church services. It has been popular at Armistice services ever since.

I vow to thee, my country, all earthly things above, Entire and whole and perfect, the service of my love; The love that asks no questions, the love that stands the test, That lays upon the altar the dearest and the best; The love that never falters, the love that pays the price, The love that makes undaunted the final sacrifice.

And there's another country, I've heard of long ago,
Most dear to them that love her, most great to them that know;
We may not count her armies, we may not see her King;
Her fortress is a faithful heart, her pride is suffering;
And soul by soul and silently her shining bounds increase,
And her ways are ways of gentleness, and all her paths are peace.







#### We Will Remember Them

Remembrance Day is on 11 November, the date the First World War finally ended in 1918, and is also known as Armistice Day. Remembrance Sunday is the second Sunday in November when the country unites and attends services to remember those who lost their lives in military conflict since 1914. Both Remembrance Day and Remembrance Sunday serve to remember those who have died in military conflict and are honoured throughout the Commonwealth and beyond.
