







Book Review

Borders and Belonging – the Book of Ruth – a story for our times By Padraig O Tuama and Glenn Jordan, Canterbury Press, £11.69

A leading Poet and a Theologian reflect on the Old Testament story of Ruth, a tale that resonates deeply in today's world with its themes of migration, the stranger, mixed cultures and religions, law and leadership, women in public life, kindness, generosity and fear.

Ruth's story speaks directly to many of the issues and deep differences that Brexit has exposed and to the polarisation taking place in many societies. Padraig O Tuama and Glenn Jordan bring the redemptive power of Ruth to bear on today's seemingly intractable social and political divisions, reflecting on its challenges and how it can help us be effective in the public square, amplify voices which are silenced, and be communities of faith in our present day.

I know from experience that dogs can get bored and are much happier with a play- mate, so in July 2017 I applied for and got Roxy, a tri colour (black, white and brown) also a Cavalier King Charles spaniel, estimated age 7 years. Although their personalities are really different, they are very close to each other. They are my delight, give me great joy and immeasurable comfort as I hope I am to them.

We have walked many miles together over long distances, something I would never have done on my own. Pre-lockdown, as Chaplain, they accompanied me to, and were a delight to the residents in our Care Homes. I do have to add Bella and Roxy have certainly made the lockdown much easier for me personally, to manage.

Trinity Sunday: Celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:


Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.' Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.' Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...' Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (The Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that the warmth and life there as well.

Father,
thank you for sending your
Holy Spirit to me,
in Jesus name. Amen



Editor: The Revd Dr Jo White continues her Reflected Faith series on the freedom that May brings....Reflected Faith: Hiding, waiting, hoping – FREE!

After many long months during the Covid pandemic we are at last beginning to be able to come together again. Some countries and some areas of some countries will be more open than others and we can only hope, pray and wait for all of us to be able to be 'free' again.

May, in the Church's calendar, is supremely the month of freedom.

During the first few weeks we continue to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus and reflect on the Bible stories of those who met Him after His crucifixion and resurrection.

Then we celebrate His Ascension – Jesus' return to His Father.

And finally, we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit on the apostles and all those locked in that Upper Room – with the subsequent birth of His Church.

The history of the PCC

And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose. **Romans 8:28**

When you next attend a PCC meeting, which is probably more likely to be by zoom than in person, you could say "Happy 100th Birthday!" to your colleagues. It is a hundred years since The Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1921 which was an important stage in the birth of PCCs.

During the First World War army Chaplains found that many men who thought of themselves as church goers were ignorant of the basics of religion. This led to a new interest in mission for the church. There were national days of prayer during the war and in 1915 there was a National Mission of Repentance and Hope. The public were more in the mood for victory than repentance. After the Armistice there was a desire for change in the national church and this led to a discussion about the links with the state.

There was a concern that Parliament was often slow to enact laws for the church and many people felt the national church should have more authority to govern itself. The setting up of Parochial Church Councils was part of that process. In the past a lot of local secular administration had been the responsibility of churchwardens in the vestry meetings. Gradually their functions were passed to local councils. Most of their remaining powers were transferred to PCCs by The Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1921.


The purpose behind these new councils was to give the laity a more prominent role in parish life to go alongside the deaconry, diocesan and national councils which became the synods and have an important role in church life. Some conservative clerics were concerned at this reform and felt that congregations would pick and choose clergy or object to a new incumbent chosen by a patron. The process of starting PCCs to share in decision making in parishes was widely accepted but a few older incumbents and those in more rural areas, failed to do either out of reluctance or ignorance.

A leading churchman in the reform movement was William Temple who became leader of the 'Life and Liberty movement' which hugely influenced the move towards democratic government in the Church of England. He was Bishop of Manchester in the 1920s, Archbishop of York from 1929 to 1942 and Archbishop of Canterbury (1942-4).

He had been a secretary of the National Mission of Repentance and Hope in 1916 and became chairman and joint leader with H. R. (Dick) Sheppard of the Life and Liberty movement. 'We demand liberty for the Church of England' he declared at a meeting in July 1917. One difficult issue was what level of commitment to church life enabled a person to be eligible to serve on a church council. It was decided that anyone on the electoral roll whether they attended services or communion regularly could participate. The then Bishop of Oxford resigned over the issue because he thought that councils must only be made up of committed regular communicants. The next Bishop of Oxford in his monthly diocesan magazine endorsed the principle






All Youth and Children's activities are currently on hold but Skye, Cheryl and Rachael are all continuing to check Government information and CofE websites for when we can all meet back.

Church Reflection



"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness"

This verse taken from Isaiah 43:19 seems quite appropriate for where we now find ourselves. For many the last year has seemed a bit like a wilderness, unsure of when we might find our next oasis and feelings of anxiety over the loss of "normal" life.

I think we've done pretty well at St Mary's over this difficult period. Unlike many other churches we re-opened as soon as

we were able and have kept our doors firmly open since. True things have been very different in terms of what we have been able to do and how we do them, but along with our regular mail deliveries, we have done our very best to keep a sense of togetherness and to provide the fellowship we all love as a church family.

Like most of you we are now looking forwards as we travel the current government road map to June 21st when hopefully most restrictions will be lifted (and please let that include singing in church). Some people may still be thinking that this means a return to exactly what we were doing before, but for all sorts of reasons this is now a season of change as God opens up new paths for us. We are aware that there will not be a new vicar coming to St Mary's at any time soon (if ever) and our future is most likely to expect a shared priest to be appointed, who will only be able to provide limited help as they will be given several parishes. With four very able Readers here at St Mary's that should not be too much of a problem, but as it is still a time off we need to look at service patterns that are sustainable. Whilst your Readers love to serve you we all have many different roles within the church to juggle, as well as fulltime employment in the case of two of us, and this past year has definitely taken us to our limits.

In terms of the outreach groups that we have run, two groups have made the difficult decision to stop their activities. The Wednesday Group and Footprints are closing their doors, but that doesn't mean ministry in these areas stops — it just allows for change. The whole area of children and youth ministry is actually at the fore front of our thinking and there are some exciting new ventures being prayed about and even initiated as I write. Equally members of the congregation have already started to come forwards with ideas to engage the older members of our community (and please keep the ideas coming). It is already starting to look like a really exciting time and one which will be made even better when we finally can complete the improvements within the building to create safer, cosier spaces in which to welcome people of all ages.

As I write this I want to really encourage you to pray about the way forward so that we clearly discern the path God is opening up. I would also like to encourage you to think what part you might play in all of this, not least maybe taking on some of the roles your Readers currently cover, in order that we can be freed up to serve in new ways more pertinent to our training. There will be more about this at the APCM on June 6th and I really encourage everyone to attend.

More than ever St Mary's needs to become a true body of Christ with everyone playing their part, no matter how small or insignificant it might seem. Only then will the streams be really able to satisfy the parched wasteland and turn it all into a blossoming landscape to the glory of God.



Act aims to serve the neighbourhood of Alvaston and surrounding districts as defined by the geographical boundaries of the Anglican parishes of St Michael and All angels (Alvaston), St Mary the Virgin (Boulton-by-Derby) and St Andrew with St Osmund (Wilmorton)

Foodbank update:

There have been some major changes to the way we run foodbank in response to the Covid -19 emergency.

On the 25th March 2020 Jane Whitney was asked to be the co-ordinator of ACT foodbank and ACT was asked to join the Derby food 4 thought Alliance as an established food bank to help with the demand in the DE24 area of the city. Paul Brookhouse is the lead for Derby food 4 thought.

The other members of the ACT team were unable to be physically present for the making up of food parcels for reasons of shielding and front line working.

The Children's centre remained open for the distribution of parcels but to minimise contact they gave the parcels to the families which we had made up and delivered from the doorway of the main building.

The main change was the provision of emergency parcels which formally we would only do on an infrequent basis this became the main demand. The requests came via the Local area co-ordinators and now requests come through the central hub who can also direct people to other help they might need.

Supply of food continues to come from ACT members, either food or cash donations, the Central Supply unit based now at an industrial unit off Ascot Drive (formally at St Alkmunds), members of the public and several local businesses.

The ACT foodbank is based at St Michael's Church Hall on Elvaston Lane several of the fellowships have keys to the building for access to the food and to help with the running of the foodbank. Grateful thanks is given for all those who help with the making up of the parcels and the running the foodbank.


We do have a healthy balance of money in the Act account and these funds may be called upon if needed in the future as the foodbank develops.



As a young child in Idaho, Rick became fascinated with music, often climbing up on the piano stool to explore the keyboard. By the age of ten he was writing songs for his Sunday School class, the first of which was "Come to Me." Young Rick loved hymns and the presentations of the church choir, he also developed a love for the guitar and honed his skills by playing along with television commercials.

Graduating from college with a media technology degree and subsequent college music course qualifications this gave him the background he needed for his future ministry. He spent 7 years teaching, spent weekends leading worship and singing with his praise team. From there he went into full-time employment with ministry of music at a church in California and continued there for 14 years. It was while he was music director at that church that he wrote his now famous song "Lord I Lift Your Name on High"

One day, as Rick was having his daily devotional, the Lord impressed on his heart that his work on our behalf was a cycle of events - Christ came from heaven to earth, gave His life on the cross for us, was buried and three days later rose from the dead and went back to His heavenly Father, making the cycle of our salvation complete. 
